VALE JOHN "JACKO" PINI

(22.05.1935 - 6.11.2022)

Jacko's forty-four years of service to the Manuka Football Club took many forms. After arriving at the Club in 1946 as a junior, Jacko retired from playing in 1965 after having played 32 first grade and over 100 reserve grade games.

He won the reserve grade Best and Fairest in 1964 and in the same year took up coaching the Colts which was a position he held for nine seasons. During this time Jacko won seven premierships (one undefeated) along with also coaching the Intermediates from 1963 – 1971 winning seven premierships (two undefeated).

Jacko was Captain Coach of Manuka reserve grade from 1961 – 1965 winning three premierships and one premiership in 1974 as a non-playing coach and took over as the reserve grade coach during the 1988 season at Manuka Weston. He coached the Manuka Weston seniors in 1989-1990 where the team were runners up in his first year. In total he won eighteen premierships as a coach. Jacko also coached many ACT representative teams including the Teal Cup and Territory's Under 19's sides. Jacko also served on the Committee from 1960-1961 and 1972-1973.

Jacko was awarded Life Membership of Manuka in 1970, received a Merit Award from the National Australian Football Council in 1974, Life Membership of the ACTAFLJ in 1981 and was inducted into the AFL Canberra Hall of Fame in 2016. Jacko was also inducted as an inaugural member of the Eastlake / Manuka Hall of Fame in 2022.

John "Jacko" Pini made a substantial impact on not only the young footballers he mentored but everyone he encountered. Jacko was universally respected and loved by all in the Canberra football community particularly at Manuka and Eastlake Football Clubs. Jacko was one of the great characters in Canberra football and one of life's true gentleman. Peter moved from Melbourne to Canberra and was quickly identified as a seriously good footballer to the extent of being touted a "*Young Gun*".

Peter first played with the Manuka Football Club in 1966 where he captained both the U17's and U19's in the same year and lead both teams to a premiership under coach Jacko Pini. Peter also won the League and Club Best and Fairest for both teams that season and played seniors on Sundays in the same year.

Peter played regular senior football in 1967 but missed out on taking the field in the Premiership team due to being involved in a car accident the week leading up to the grand final.

Peter was called up to National Service in the late 1960s but remained connected with Manuka. In 1978 Peter played in a premiership in Manuka's Monaro team with his brother Barry who was Captain-Coach of the side.

Peter wore the number 9 guernsey at Manuka to which his son Chris would don in later years. Four of his grandchildren - Ted, Cecilia, Lucy, and Alexander have all played for the Club – the latter three proudly wearing their Grandad's number 9 for the Eastlake Demons juniors.

PRESIDENT & CHIEF EXECUTIVE'S REPORT 2022

Similar to the two previous years, 2022 began with a high number of community transmission of Covid 19 and the reintroduction of mandated mask wearing for indoor settings which once again impacted the hospitality industry. With costs and interest rates on the rise putting pressure on the Company's pricing policy, combined with substantially increased staff shortages, it can only be described as one of the most difficult trading environments the business has experienced in my tenure.

Thankfully, the second quarter saw the situation start to 'normalise' and we did begin to experience an improvement across all areas of our business which resulted in an overall increase in total revenue for the year of 34%. Increased costs led to an increase in total expenses of nearly 27% for the year with the Company posting an overall profit of \$93,082 for the year ending 31 December 2022. This was a pleasing result given the myriad of challenges experienced.

As reported last year, the Company commenced negotiations with a reputable developer which are ongoing at the time of writing this report due to delays in obtaining a lease variation from the ACT Government. This process has been going on since 11 March 2022 when the DA was lodged. To date there has been no formal response from the Government which could take a further couple of months despite attempts to seek assistance from the Minister's office to expedite this frustrating and cumbersome process. From the Club's experience only one word can be used to describe the Environment Planning and Sustainability Directorate, INCOMPETENT.

Following ongoing attempts to seek assistance to improve the standard of Kingston Oval's facilities I'm pleased to report that the Club managed to obtain funding for the improvement of the changerooms to bring them into the 21st century and become more female friendly. These works are currently underway and will be warmly received from all users of this facility when completed. I would like to acknowledge the hard work by our Vice President (football), and GM of football Maureen Cahill and Shaun Young in obtaining financial support from the ACT Government for this project.

As mentioned last year the Eastlake bistro space was modernised which has been very favourably received and is a vast improvement on the old cafeteria feel. Consequently, your Board has agreed that the Calwell Club also needs similar modernisation. The Board has engaged Capezio Copland Architects to assist in this process which will incorporate a refurbished gaming lounge, bistro, main lounge, and the old sports bar area. The Club is currently in negotiations with the preferred tenderer with works hopefully commencing in May 2023. In addition to the internal upgrade the Company was fortunate to have been successful in obtaining a \$150,000 grant from the ACT Government's Diversification and Sustainability Support Fund. The purpose of the funding is for the installation of roof mounted solar panels at each of our venues. The Club sincerely thanks the ACT Government for their assistance in this project which will provide approximately 20% of the Clubs daily energy needs. Works have already commenced installation at Calwell and Gungahlin with Eastlake due for installation in April 2023.

As you may be aware the ACT Government is considering the introduction of lowering bet limits on electronic gaming machines from \$10 to \$5 plus the introduction of \$100 credit limit as part of its agenda to reduce harm. While the Club actively supports any measure that reduces harm, we believe it should be evidence based and done in a sustainable and affordable way. Without getting into the details due to the complexity of system protocols, the industry considers the current proposal unaffordable which also comes with significant recurring costs. For reference, Eastlake would be required to replace 120 and upgrade 149 electronic gaming machines at a cost of approximately \$3.9m. Needless to say, this would drastically impact the Company's viability if funding assistance was unavailable. Thankfully, the ACT Government has taken onboard this feedback and is continuing its dialogue with the industry. Let's hope we get a sensible outcome that is satisfactory to both parties.

For our Gungahlin members you will have noticed construction commencing on Sierra Apartments on the east side of the Club. The Sierra development is schedule to take 18 months to completion. During the works program there may be some minor disruption to the Club with Efkarpidis Street closed east of the Club's driveway for a period of 5 months, but we don't anticipate any other disruptions at this stage except for some minor works along Efkarpidis street frontage to install underground high voltage power to the site.

The 2022 football season returned to normality after 3 years of interruptions but unfortunately the season didn't produce the results the Club was looking for across senior football in terms of silverware in the cabinet. However, there were a couple of shining lights being the Women's Second Grade making a preliminary final, and the Women's Rising Stars Black winning the premiership after going in as underdogs against Belconnen. During the year Aaron Bruce broke the club record for games played beating Guy Cannons figure of 263. We congratulate Aaron on this outstanding achievement given he has plenty more games left in him. It was with great sadness that we acknowledge the passing of two great stalwarts of the Club in Jacko (John) Pini and Peter Maher. Details of Jacko and Peter's contributions are on pages 4 & 5.



I'm pleased to report that the Club was awarded the ClubsACT Education Learning and Development Award in recognition of its contribution to social inclusion and building awareness of those with a disability. Eastlake Group has built a partnership with Koomarri over the last few years and has provided opportunity for their clients to gain exposure to the industry and ultimately paid employment. The Club is fortunate to have a strong connection with community programs that build skills and development and ultimately, we hope this leads to paid employment pathways for those with a disability.

Lastly, I would like to take this opportunity to thank the Board for their ongoing oversight and passion for our Club as well as the team of dedicated and professional staff who continually strive to make our venues the best they can be, not only from a member's perspective but also as a preferred employer of choice by our staff.

Principal Activities

The principal activities of the Group during the financial year were the provision of support for the Club's Australian Rules football teams by operating licensed clubs, and sponsorship of various community groups.

No significant change in the nature of these activities occurred during the year.

Objectives

The Group's objectives are to:

Foster and promote the game of Australian rules football in the community; promote enjoyment of Australian culture and to foster friendship among members; to provide a range of social and recreational amenities for members and their guests; and to support sporting, cultural, charitable and other community groups in their contributions to society.

To achieve the objectives, the Group has adopted the following strategies:

- Provide significant funding to various senior and junior AFL programs;
- Provide four modern premises for social enjoyment; and
- Support over 100 community groups in their contribution to society.

Key Performance Measures

The Group measures its own performance through the use of both quantitative and qualitative benchmarks. The benchmarks are used by the directors to assess the financial sustainability of the Group and whether the Group's objectives are being achieved.

Result

The Group's operating profit for the financial year was \$93,082 (2021: operating profit of \$345,863, before a loss on revaluation of land and buildings of \$392,527).

Company Limited by Guarantee

The Club is incorporated under the Corporations Act 2001 and is a company limited by guarantee. If the Club is wound up, the constitution states that each member is required to contribute a maximum of \$10 each towards meeting any outstanding obligations of the Club. As at 31 December 2022 there were 28,776 (2021: 27,594) members guaranteeing to contribute \$10 each in the event of the Club being wound up.



1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

These consolidated financial statements and notes represent those of Eastlake Football Club Limited (the Club) and its controlled entity EFC 1926 Pty Ltd (jointly referred to as the Group).

The separate financial statements of the parent entity, Eastlake Football Club Limited have not been presented within this financial report as permitted by amendments made to the Corporations Act 2001.

Basis of Preparation

The financial statements are general purpose financial statements that have been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards - Simplified Disclosures, Interpretations of the Australian Accounting Standards Board and the Corporations Act 2001.

The Club is a not-for-profit company limited by guarantee, incorporated and domiciled in Australia.

The financial statements are presented in Australian dollars which is the entity's functional and presentation currency. The amounts presented in the financial statements have been rounded to the nearest dollar.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accrual basis and are based on historical costs modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities.

New and Amended Accounting Policies Adopted by the Club

The Club has adopted all of the new, revised or amended accounting standards and interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board that are mandatory for the current reporting period.

For the year ended, the Club has adopted AASB 1060 General Purpose Financial Statements - Simplified Disclosures for For-Profit and Not-for-Profit Tier 2 Entities.

Prior to the adoption of AASB 1060, the Club prepared financial statements under the Reduced Disclosure Requirements framework. The adoption of AASB 1060 has not had any material impact on the financial performance or position of the Club in either the current or prior financial reporting periods. As a result, comparative information has not been restated.

The adoption of AASB 1060 has resulted in some minor disclosure changes in the financial statements.

Going Concern

The directors have prepared these financial statements on a going concern basis which contemplates continuity of normal business activities and that the realisation of assets and settlement of liabilities will occur in the normal course of business. The Group has a deficiency in net current assets of \$9,760,542 at 31 December 2022.

The Directors consider the going concern basis to be appropriate on the following basis:

- The Group has met all contractual repayment and interest obligations during the year ended and up to the date of these financial statements.
- The Group expects to be able to manage its cash balances and cash flows and pay its debts as and when they fall due.
- The Group had a positive net operating cash flow for the year ended of \$1,642,417 (2021:net inflow of \$3,088,348).
- The Group made a net operating profit before revaluation of land and buildings of \$93,082 (2021: \$345,863).

The ability of the Group to continue as a going concern is dependent on the Group's ability to meet its debts as and when they become due and payable.

Material accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are presented below and have been consistently applied unless otherwise stated.

1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Accounting Policies

(a) Principles of Consolidation

The consolidated financial statements incorporate the assets, liabilities and results of entities controlled by the Club at reporting date. A controlled entity is any entity over which the Club has the power to govern the financial and operating policies so as to obtain benefits from its activities. Control will generally exist when the parent owns, directly or indirectly through subsidiaries, more than half of the voting power of an entity. In assessing the power to govern, the existence and effect of holdings of actual and potential voting rights are also considered.

In preparing the consolidated financial statements, all inter-group balances and transactions between entities in the Group have been eliminated on consolidation. Accounting policies of subsidiaries have been changed where necessary to ensure consistency with those adopted by the parent entity.

(b) Income Tax

The Group is exempt from Income Tax pursuant to section 50-45 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997 as a non-profit sporting club.

(c) Inventories

Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Costs include direct costs and appropriate overheads, if any. Costs are assigned on the basis of weighted average costs.

(d) Property, Plant and Equipment

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost or fair value less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment.

Where a revaluation has been performed, any accumulated depreciation at the date of the revaluation is eliminated against the gross carrying amount of the asset and the net amount is restated to the revalued amount of the asset.

The carrying amount of property, plant and equipment is reviewed at the end of the reporting period to ensure it is not in excess of the recoverable amount from these assets. The recoverable amount is assessed on the basis of expected net cash flows that will be received from the assets' employment and subsequent disposal. The expected net cash flows have been discounted to their present values in determining recoverable amounts.

An asset's carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount.

Subsequent costs are included in the asset's carrying amount or recognised as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the entity and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. All other costs (e.g. repairs and maintenance) are charged to the statement of comprehensive income during the financial period in which they are incurred.

Increases in the carrying amount arising on revaluation of assets are credited to a revaluation reserve and recognised in other comprehensive income. Decreases that offset previous increases of the same asset are charged against fair value reserves and recognised in other comprehensive income. All other decreases are charged to the profit or loss.

(d) Property, Plant and Equipment (continued)

The assets' residual values and useful lives are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at the end of the reporting period.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with the carrying amount. These gains and losses are included in the profit or loss. When revalued assets are sold, amounts included in the revaluation reserve relating to that asset are transferred to retained earnings

Depreciation

The depreciable amount of all property, plant and equipment, except for land, is depreciated on a straight-line basis or diminishing balance basis from the time the asset is available for use. Leasehold improvements are depreciated over the shorter of the term of the lease and the asset's useful life.

The depreciation rates used for each class of depreciable asset are:

(e) Financial Instruments

Initial recognition and measurement

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when the Group becomes a party to the contractual provisions to the instrument. For financial assets, this is the date that the Group commits itself to either the purchase or sale of the asset (ie trade date accounting is adopted).

Financial instruments (except for trade receivables) are initially measured at fair value plus transaction costs, except where the instrument is classified "at fair value through profit or loss", in which case transaction costs are expensed to profit or loss immediately. In most circumstances trade receivables are initially measured at the transaction price.

Classification and subsequent measurement

Financial instruments are subsequently measured at either fair value or amortised cost using the effective interest rate method. The subsequent measurement depends on the classification of the financial instrument as described below.

Fair value represents the amount for which an asset could be exchanged or a liability settled, between knowledgeable, willing parties in an arm's length transaction. Where available, quoted prices in an active market are used to determine fair value. In other circumstances, valuation techniques are adopted.

The effective interest method is used to allocate interest income or interest expense over the relevant period.

Financial assets

All recognised financial assets are subsequently measured in their entirety at either amortised cost or fair value, depending on the classification of the financial assets.

Financial assets that meet the following conditions are subsequently measured at amortised cost:

- the financial asset is held within a business model whose objective is to hold financial assets in order to collect contractual cash flows; and
- the contractual terms of the financial asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principals and interest on the principal amount outstanding.

Financial assets that meet the following conditions are subsequently measured at fair value through other comprehensive income (FVTOCI);

- the financial asset is held within a business model whose objective is achieved by both collecting contractual cash flows and selling the financial assets; and
- the contractual terms of the financial asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding.

By default, all other financial assets are subsequently measured at fair value through profit or loss (FVTPL).

Despite the above, the Group may make the following irrevocable election/designation at initial recognition of a financial asset:

- the Group may irrevocably elect to present subsequent changes in fair value of an equity instrument in other comprehensive income if certain criteria are met; and
- the Group may irrevocably designate a financial asset that meets the amortised cost or FVTOCI criteria as measured at FVTPL if doing so eliminates or significantly reduces an accounting mismatch.

Financial liabilities

All financial liabilities are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method or at FVTPL.

Impairment of financial assets

The Group recognises a loss allowance for expected credit losses on financial assets that are measured at amortised cost or at FVTOCI. No impairment loss is recognised for investments in equity instruments. The amount of expected credit losses is updated at each reporting date to reflect changes in credit risk since initial recognition of the respective financial asset.

The Group recognises lifetime expected credit losses for trade receivables. The expected credit losses on these financial assets are estimated based on the Group's historical credit loss experience adjusted for factors that are specific to the debtors, general economic conditions and an assessment of both the current as well as the future direction of conditions at the reporting date, including time value of money where appropriate.instruments are recognised initially on the date that the Group becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

(f) Impairment of Non-Financial Assets

At the end of the reporting period, the Group reviews the carrying values of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs to sell and value in use, is compared to the asset's carrying value. Value in use is either the discounted cash flows relating to the asset or depreciated replacement cost if the criteria in AASB 136 'Impairment of Assets' are met. Any excess of the asset's carrying value over its recoverable amount is expensed to the profit or loss.

Where it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an individual asset, the recoverable amount of the cash generating unit to which the asset belongs is estimated.

(g) Leases

At inception of a contract, the Group assesses whether a contract is, or contains, a lease. A contract is considered to contain a lease if it allows the Group the right to control the use of an identified asset over a period of time in return for consideration.

Where a contract or arrangement contains a lease, the Group recognises a right-of-use asset and a lease liability at the commencement date of the lease.

A right-of-use asset is initially measured at cost, which is the present value of future lease payments adjusted for any lease payments made at or before the commencement date, plus any make-good obligations and initial direct costs incurred. Lease assets are depreciated using the straight-line method over the shorter of their useful life and the lease term. Periodic adjustments are made for any re-measurements of the lease liabilities and for impairment losses.

Lease liabilities are initially measured at the present value of future minimum lease payments, discounted using the Group's incremental borrowing rate if the rate implicit in the lease cannot be readily determined, and are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest rate. Minimum lease payments include fixed payments, amounts expected to be paid under a residual value guarantee, the exercise price of purchase options for which the Group is reasonably certain to exercise and incorporate the Group's expectations of lease extension options.

The lease liability is remeasured when there are changes in future lease payments arising from a change in rates, index or lease terms from exercising an extension or termination option. A corresponding adjustment is made to the carrying amount of the lease assets.

Short term leases (lease term of 12 months or less) and leases of low value assets (\$10,000 or less) are recognised as incurred as an expense in the consolidated income statement.

(h) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less which are convertible to a known amount of cash and subject to an insignificant risk of change in value, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within short-term borrowings in current liabilities on the statement of financial position.

(i) Employee Benefits

Provision is made for the Group's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee benefits that are expected to be settled within one year have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled plus related on-costs are disclosed as current liabilities. Employee benefits expected to be settled more than twelve months after the end of the reporting period have been measured at the present value of the estimated future cash outflows to be made for those benefits. In calculating the present value of future cash flows in respect of long service leave, the probability of long service leave being taken is based upon historical data.

Contributions are made by the Group to an employee superannuation fund and are charged as expenses when incurred.

(j) Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the Group has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured.

(k) Revenue and Other Income

Revenue is measured at the amount which the Group expects to receive in consideration for satisfying performance obligations to a customer. A performance obligation is the distinct good or service defined within the contract with a customer. The transaction price is allocated to one or more performance obligations contained within the contract, with revenue being recognised as or when the performance obligation is satisfied.

Where consideration comprises variable components, the amount recognised as revenue is constrained to that amount that would not result in a significant reversal of the cumulative revenue recognised when that uncertainty is resolved.

Timing of Revenue Recognition

Revenue is recognised either at a point in time or over time, when (or as) the Group satisfies performance obligations by transferring the promised goods or services to its customers.

If the Group satisfies a performance obligation before it receives the consideration, the Group recognises either a contract asset or a receivable in its statement of financial position, depending on whether something other than the passage of time is required before the consideration is due.

Revenue from poker machine clearances is the amount of monies collected from the poker machine, net of the amount paid out as winnings to the customers.

A number of covenants have been imposed by the bank including EBITDA as a percentage of revenue to exceed 15%, debt service ratio to exceed 1.25 times, and leverage ratio to be less than 4 times. The Club did not meet the leverage ratio and EBITDA as a percentage of revenue covenants at year end (2021: leverage ratio). The breach had not been remedied before these financial statements were authorised for issue. The bank is aware of this technical breach and has continued to support the Club by providing ongoing lending facilities, however, as a result of the breach, the contruction loan has been classified as a current liability, in accordance with Accounting Standards.

The Club also holds a business credit card facility with a limit of \$250,000 of which \$240,106 was unused as at 31 December 2022 (2021: \$205,593).

Recipients of in-kind support of a significant value are required to enter into an MoU similar to those community organisations receiving cash.

This commitment and our processes and procedures are reviewed by the Board of the Eastlake Group on an annual basis.

EASTLAKE DEMONS REPORT 2022

After three interrupted seasons things finally returned to normal, with a full home and away season and finals series.

During the off season the senior men's program was severely impacted with a number of players leaving to head down the highway to competitions like AFL Riverina, Hume and Farrar Leagues. The incentives provided to those players where at a level that would not have been sustainable for the EFC to even try and match. As a Club we took the very strong stance that we were not going to play the money game. Rather our focus would be on those players who wanted to remain with Eastlake and the development of our transitioning junior players. We want players who are committed to the Club and want to achieve premiership success.

Our stance created its own set of challenges, namely playing younger players who may or may not have been ready for senior football, this issue in our men's senior space flowed through all senior men's grades and significantly impacted our Rising Stars program. The upside, however, was the identification of the depth of our young talent at the Club, and the fact that as we move into the 2024 season we have a number of player who already experienced senior football.

Across all senior programs we managed to participate in finals (with the exception being the Men's Rising Stars) but unfortunately bowed out early with Men's First Grade losing to Ainslie in the first final, Women's First Grade losing to Queanbeyan in the first final, Men's Second Grade losing to Queanbeyan in the first final. However, the shining light was the Women's Second Grade who once again continued their development as a football team by reaching finals for the 3rd consecutive season and unfortunately narrowly missing out on participating in a grand final by losing to Molonglo by 12 points.

Congratulations also goes to the Women's Rising Stars Black team who achieved premiership success by beating the muchfancied Belconnen in the Grand Final. This was even more of a feat than normal, given that we had two Women's Rising Stars teams in the competition and that we had maintained our policy position of evenly splitting talent within the teams. The Women's Rising Stars Red team also performed exceptionally well throughout the course of the season but unfortunately ran into the Black team in the preliminary final.

The growth in girls and women football is something that the Club is extremely proud of, and to have two players in Catherine Brown and Cambridge McCormick drafted to Hawthorn and GWS Giants respectively in 2022 makes the Club even prouder of our women's program.

As we move forward the Club will continue to invest further in women's football to ensure that the same resources are provided across all our football programs no matter what the gender.

The 2022 season saw one of the Club's favourite sons in Aaron Bruce break the long-standing games record for First Grade by surpassing Guy Cannon's record of 262 games. Congratulations to Aaron on this remarkable achievement and we hope that there a few more seasons left in Aaron and



that the missing piece of his football resume in winning a premiership with his beloved Demons comes to fruition, as it would be a fitting reward for the service he has personally given to the Eastlake Demons.

Our junior programs saw an increase in female participation with the ratio of female players and male players now being 49% to 51% respectively. The season was a successful one with U12 Girls and U14 mixed both winning premierships and with 21 players in the GWS Giants male and female academies and two players being selected in the AFL multicultural team the future looks bright.

There was also individual success with Keanan Patron and Jesse Borghouts winning the league Best & Fairest in U17 boys and U14 mixed.

A big thank you goes to all the volunteer coaches, managers, and the parents of the juniors for their tireless work in making our junior programs a place of destination for young footballers.

To all our valued sponsors, the support and commitment you have provided to our football programs is tremendous and we sincerely thank you for allowing the Eastlake Demons to partner with you. We look forward to working with you on our strong partnerships into the future. Throughout the course of the 2022 season the football directors undertook a review of all things football, with one of the main outcomes being a desire and willingness to invest more into ensuring our football programs achieve the outcomes that we aspire to as a club.

In doing so, the previous governance structure has been revised. We thank former members Keith Miller, Stuart Marshall, Alex Smith and Brett Cunningham, Catherine Brown and Stella Ajani for their significant contribution.

Off the field 2022 was a big year for the EFC, we celebrated in May 2022 the inaugural Hall of Fame. The EFC inducted 15 members, celebrating some 90 plus years of football. Special thanks goes to the Hall of Fame Committee members, Keith Miller, Alex Smith, Ken Grigg, Emily Diprose and Brett Cunningham.

Finally, we would like to thank the Eastlake Board for both supporting and allowing the Football Committee and Management to implement strategies and protocols that enables the Eastlake Demons to facilitate our senior and junior male and female programs.


