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# President's Report

### Wayne Rogers

It is again my pleasure to report to members on behalf of the Board and management on the performance of the Ainslie Football and Social Club Limited (Ainslie Group) for the financial year 2018/19 (FY2019).

The Board of Directors and management team continued to experience ongoing external challenges throughout the year. Despite this the Board and management have maintained a strong operational approach that has seen the Group result improve year on year.

The past financial year has seen an operating profit of \$32k against an operating loss of \$593k in the previous financial year. The Board and management have worked extremely hard at containing our operational expenses in recent years while Government charges, taxes and insurance expense increases have all contributed to ongoing operational cost pressures. Over the past four years our operating loss has reduced from \$955k to a profit of \$32k. A very positive achievement.

Revenues were up slightly on last year at \$28.2m (2018 -\$28.1m). Given the current subdued retail environment this is seen as a positive result.

From 1st July we saw ACT
Government changes to the
Community Purpose Contribution
Scheme come into effect. These
changes introduced greater
scrutiny and mandatory reporting
requirements on how Clubs in the

ACT claim and distribute support to community organisations. As a consequence of these changes the club has had to allocate additional expense and labour to assist with the compliance and navigation of the scheme.

Last year I also reported on ACT Government plans for the reduction of EGMs across the club sector. In February 2019 the group removed 80 machines from our venues as part of the 20% reduction target. As part of the voluntary handback scheme the group received an in-kind value for each machine which can only be utilised against Government charges that would arise from diversification or development plans. The in-kind value that has been set aside from this is approximately \$1.2m.

The past year saw the departure from the Board of Malcolm Scholes. Malcolm joined the Ainslie Group board in 2004 and has served continually as a Director since that time, serving in the Office of Vice President from 2007 to 2008 and of President from 2009 to 2016. Malcolm was also made a Life Member of the Social club in 2017.

Malcolm brought a wealth of experience, knowledge and a cool head when guiding the board through several difficult periods. This time saw constant regulatory change by the ACT Government which has challenged the very existence and ongoing viability of sporting and community Clubs in the

ACT. He was astute and decisive in his approach while always conscious of being inclusive and considerate of other Directors' views. He provided a balance between the Board's commercial obligations and its constitutional sporting and community objectives.

This balance brought a perspective and understanding of why the Ainslie Group exists that can easily be overlooked when the business is under commercial pressure. Throughout his tenure as a Director, Vice President and President, Malcolm remained resolute in his support of the Ainslie Football Club (AFC).

He guided the Group through key internal operational changes and asset divestment initiatives following a review by KPMG and major refurbishments at both the Gungahlin Lakes and Ainslie club venues.

Malcolm was always a strong advocate for the identification of diversification and development opportunities for the Group's assets to ensure the future success and growth of the Ainslie Group for many years to come.

The Ainslie community would like to thank Malcolm for his outstanding contribution as a player, coach and Board member of Ainslie Football and Social Club. I know that Malcolm will continue to take a keen interest in the affairs of the Board, and we wish him all the very best for the future.

The Board and management remain focused and committed in investing in our core business of licensed clubs. Within the Ainslie Football club, we refurbished the space vacated by the removal of the EGM's in January 2019 and expanded this area to increase our capacity for members to use our dining and lounge room facilities. Feedback from members utilising these new facilities has been very positive.

I am also pleased to inform members that the Board has endorsed the investment in refurbishing our kitchen, seating and bar facilities within the dining area of Gungahlin Lakes club. This refurbishment is long overdue, and we are very excited that this investment will deliver the same high class dining facilities that members experience in our Limestone restaurant at Ainslie Football club. It is expected that the completion of this project will be July 2019.

Throughout this year there has been very little progress on development opportunities surrounding both our venues. In early February 2019 the ACT Government put a hold on all development applications for properties zoned PRZ2 and CZ6 under which our group leases fall. As I prepare this report Government has yet to publish its findings and recommendations from which ACT Clubs should have more clarity around what they are able to develop on such leases.

Despite this, the Group has continued to investigate what development opportunities may be available under our existing leases. In July we started early investigations for childcare and other community activity opportunities located within our "Ainslie precinct" off Wakefield Avenue. We are in the early stages of this process and are aiming to present to Government early concept design plans in the new year with our aim of submitting a development application before June 2020. This application will form part of our long-term master plan for the Ainslie precinct and our overall master plan for both our precincts.

The Board is completely committed and open to exploring all available development options to ensure we remain a strong viable community organisation. This is a very long, drawn-out process with many phases and aspects that the Group must undertake over the coming years in order to progress to a stage where we have approved plans and can outline our long-term master plan strategy to members.

#### AINSLIE FOOTBALL CLUB

I would like to congratulate the Ainslie Football Club President, Lee Phillips, his board, coaches and all people associated with another successful season.

It was a wonderful achievement to win the first-grade division grand final for the fourth consecutive year. An extremely difficult thing to achieve in the modern game of AFL and the Ainslie Group praises your great efforts. We would also like to congratulate the Ainslie Football Club on your positive financial performance this year.

#### **GROUP SUB-COMMITTEES**

I am again pleased to report the Board continues to have a strong and positive relationship with its counterpart the Gungahlin Lakes Golf Club.

#### OUTLOOK

The Group and ClubsACT will continue to face uncertainty and challenges in the Club sector within the Australian Capital Territory. We are now within 12 months of the next ACT Government elections and the Group and ClubsACT are working extremely hard to ensure that open lines of communication with Government continue to remain positive. Whatever the outcomes of the election we will strive to build more productive and positive relationships into the future.

On behalf of the Board we would like to acknowledge and thank the CEO, Simon Patterson, CFO Stephen Gallacher and the management team for their continued efforts throughout the year. We look forward to serving our members and stakeholders and to delivering positive outcomes in 2020.

# Chief Executive Officer's Report

Dear Members,

The club environment continues to be faced with a range of internal and external challenges, many of which appear to be the new norm however I remain buoyed by our resilience and ability to tackle these challenges head-on.

The past 12 months have seen further downward pressure from Government with the introduction of a range of reforms that continue to create uncertainty in our environment. In February the club participated in the Government's voluntary gaming machine reduction scheme by surrendering 80 machines as part of the notional 20% reduction target.

As noted in my report last year, the foreshadowed changes to the Community Contributions scheme took effect from 1 July. Under the changes, the club has encountered a heightened regulatory environment that will challenge our core constitutional objectives and the ability to service the needs of our local community.

Essential community funding will be further impacted by a range of new charges introduced on 1 July that includes a monthly levy on gaming machines and compulsory contributions to the Chief Minister's Charity Fund. These new charges are additional expenses which we have to deal with, and which will reduce the surplus funds generated by our business.

I am pleased to report that for 2019 Financial year the club recorded an operating profit of \$32k against an operating loss of \$593k in the 2018 financial year. The entire team has worked diligently to ensure that operational expenditure was well contained and the requisite efficiencies where achieved.

The Board and management remain focused and committed in our long-term strategy of ensuring we continue to invest in our core business of licensed clubs. Maintaining vibrant and relevant clubs is of utmost importance in providing a safe, welcoming and family friendly environment. In early 2020 we will undertake a major refurbishment of the Lakes Bistro at Gungahlin which will include an overhaul of the kitchen facilities and dining areas. Abeo Architects, who successfully undertook the refurbishment program at Ainslie in 2015/2016, has again been engaged to lead the project. It is anticipated that these works will be complete by July 2020. The club will continue to offer a range of dining options during this period however I thank you in advance for your patience and understanding during the construction phase.

Ainslie's dinning precinct, Limestone continues to exceed expectations and has fast positioned itself as a go-to dining destination of the inner-north. With the ever-changing landscape within the club sector we are focused on exploring diversification and development opportunities. Board and management continue to look at and consider the effective development of our existing assets and are engaged with industry professionals to ensure the appropriate advice and planning outcomes are achieved. It is anticipated this may take between 5-10 years to come to fruition. I will continue to keep members informed as plans progress. Whilst future sustainability is paramount, steering a business away from the reliance of gaming revenue is not an overnight exercise.

In the meantime, we anticipate the development of childcare facilities to be located within the Ainslie precinct by 2022, whilst in the early planning stage we aim to have a development application before Government by mid-2020.

Our commitment to the community continues with the Group's Community Contributions program again assisting many sporting, community and charitable organisations to the tune of \$942k in 2019. We are acutely aware of how critical this support is for many groups, and as I have mentioned in previous years, really goes to the heart of the purpose for community clubs.

Of course, whatever the Club is able to achieve can only come about because of the hard working and dedicated staff. This was again formally recognised when the Club received the 2019 ClubsACT "People's Choice Award", an award voted by members, guests and the general public recognising outstanding service, hospitality and facilities for the third year. I would like to sincerely acknowledge our wonderful staff, it's your effort that makes the Club who we are.

We have many loyal and long serving staff working for Ainslie and special mention must go to the following staff who reached a significant milestone in 2019 – congratulations on this wonderful achievement.

Course Superintendent, Shane Dawson and his team should again be commended for their excellent work.

I would like to recognise Stephen Gallacher the Group's Chief Financial Officer, for his dedication and considered advice over the past 12 months.

I would also like to acknowledge the President, Wayne Rogers and Board of Directors for their ongoing support, guidance and commitment. We are very fortunate to have a strong and stable board. The Club remains financially stable and is able to support the members and broader community. I couldn't continue to move forward without the full support of the board.

This year saw the departure of former President and Life Member Malcolm Scholes. Mal served on the board for 16 years and brought a wealth of experience and knowledge. I have personally benefited from Mal's support and mentorship over the past 6 years and wish him every happiness for the future.

As always, a very special thanks must go to all our members, it is your continued support that allows the Ainslie Group to provide great services and facilities and to build on these into the future. I look forward to a positive and productive 2020.

#### COMPANY SECRETARY

The Company Secretary is Mr. Simon Patterson. Mr. Simon Patterson is also the Chief Executive Officer of Ainslie Football and Social Club Ltd.

#### PRINCIPAL ACTIVITY

The principal activity of the Club, a not-for-profit entity, during the financial year was the maintenance and conduct of a licensed social club. There were no significant changes in the nature of the Club's principal activities during the financial year.

The principal activity of the entity during the financial year was the operation of two licensed Club venues through the provision of bars, restaurants, gaming facilities and function centres, as well as the ongoing provision and maintenance of sporting facilities and financial support for Australian football and golf activities.

The Club's short-term objectives primarily focus on fostering Australian football, golf and other sports as required. This is achieved through the provision of social and sporting venues for the recreation of our members and their guests and from which the entity may derive revenue. As a not-for-profit entity, all revenues are reinvested for the benefit of members through the provision of a diverse range of services and amenities.

In the longer term it is the objective to ensure the sustainability of the entity and to explore and develop diversified investment options with the view of maximizing return on investment compatible with the continued broad range support provided to members and the wider community.

To achieve these objectives the entity operates two licensed Club venues in the ACT and provides support to several sporting and community organisations through community grants, facility infrastructure and other methods. Further, it strives to retain quality staff and volunteers committed to work in hospitality and in sport and believes that in so doing, this further assists with its long-term success.

The entity has strong financial management and corporate governance systems managed through the Club's business plan, key performance indicators, risk-management plan and audit programs. Monitoring of financial performance is reviewed regularly by Executive Management and the Board.

#### **OPERATING RESULTS**

The net operating result of the Club after providing for income tax amounted to a profit of \$32,023 (2018: loss of \$592,686).

#### DIVIDENDS

In accordance with the constitution, the Club is a Company limited by guarantee to the extent of \$2.00 per member and accordingly no shares or debentures have been issued and no dividends have been recommended or paid since the start of the financial year.

#### REVIEW OF OPERATIONS

Operations comprised the running of licensed Club facilities and the provision of member services.

### SIGNIFICANT CHANGES IN STATE OF AFFAIRS

During the financial year there was no significant change in the state of affairs of the entity other than that referred to in the financial statements or notes thereto.

#### **FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS**

Disclosure of information regarding likely developments in the operations of the entity in future financial years and the expected results thereof is likely to result in unreasonable prejudice to the entity. Accordingly, this information has not been disclosed in this report.

#### LIABILITY OF MEMBERS

### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 SEPTEMBER 2019

#### NOTE 1: SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial statements cover Ainslie Football and Social Club Limited as an individual entity, incorporated and domiciled in Australia. Ainslie Football and Social Club Limited is a Company limited by guarantee.

a. Basis of preparation

These general purpose financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards - Reduced Disclosure Requirements and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ('AASB') and the Corporations Act 2001.

Material accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are presented within the statements and have been consistently applied unless stated otherwise. The financial statements, except for the cash flow information, have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs, modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities. The amounts presented in the financial statements have been rounded to the nearest dollar.

b. New or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations adopted

The Club has adopted all of the new or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ('AASB') that are mandatory for the current reporting period.

The adoption of these Accounting Standards and Interpretations did not have any significant impact on the financial performance or position of the Club. The following Accounting Standards and Interpretations are most relevant to the Club: AASB 9 Financial Instruments

The Club has adopted AASB 9 from 1 October 2018. The standard introduced new classification and measurement models for financial assets. A financial asset shall be measured at amortised cost if it is held within a business model whose objective is to hold assets in order to collect contractual cash flows which arise on specified dates and that are solely principal and interest. A debt investment shall be measured at fair value through other comprehensive income if it is held within a business model whose objective is to both hold assets in order to collect contractual cash flows which arise on specified dates that are solely principal and interest as well as selling the asset on the basis of its fair value.

All other financial assets are classified and measured at fair value through profit or loss unless the entity makes an irrevocable election on initial recognition to present gains and losses on equity instruments (that are not held-for-trading or contingent consideration recognised in a business combination) in other comprehensive income ('OCI'). Despite these requirements, a financial asset may be irrevocably designated as measured at fair value through profit or loss to reduce the effect of, or eliminate, an accounting mismatch. For financial liabilities designated at fair value through profit or loss, the standard requires the portion of the change in fair value that relates to the entity's own credit risk to be presented in OCI (unless it would create an accounting mismatch). New simpler hedge accounting requirements are intended to more closely align the accounting treatment with the risk management activities of the entity. New impairment requirements use an 'expected credit loss' ('ECL') model to recognise an allowance. Impairment is measured using a 12-month ECL method unless the credit risk on a financial instrument has increased significantly since initial recognition in which case the lifetime ECL method is adopted. For receivables, a simplified approach to measuring expected credit losses using a lifetime expected loss allowance is available.

Impact of adoption

AASB 9 was adopted using the modified retrospective approach and as such comparatives have not been restated. There was no impact on opening retained profits as at 1 October 2018.

c. Critical accounting estimates

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts in the financial statements. Management continually evaluates its judgements and estimates in relation to assets, liabilities, contingent liabilities, revenue and expenses. Management bases its judgements, estimates and assumptions on historical experience and on other various factors, including expectations of future events, management believes to be reasonable under the circumstances. The resulting accounting judgements and estimates will seldom equal the related actual results. The judgements, estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities (refer to the respective notes) within the next financial year are discussed below.

i. Estimation of useful lives of assets

The Club determines the estimated useful lives and related depreciation and amortisation charges for its property, plant and equipment. The useful lives could change significantly as a result of technical innovations or some other event. The depreciation and amortisation charge will increase where the useful lives are less than previously estimated lives, or technically obsolete or non-strategic assets that have been abandoned or sold will be written off or written down.

#### NOTE 1: SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

c. Critical accounting estimates (continued)

#### ii. Employee benefits provision

As discussed in note 14, the liability for employee benefits expected to be settled more than 12 months from the reporting date are recognised and measured at the present value of the estimated future cash flows to be made in respect of all employees at the reporting date. In determining the present value of the liability, estimates of attrition rates and pay increases through promotion and inflation have been taken into account.

#### d. Comparative Figures

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Where required by Accounting Standards comparative figures have been adjusted to conform with changes in presentation for the current financial year.

#### e. Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Tax Office. In these circumstances the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of the expense. Receivables and payables in the statement of financial position are shown inclusive of GST.

#### f. Company Limited by Guarantee

In accordance with the Constitution the Club is a Company limited by guarantee and accordingly no shares have been issued and no dividends recommended or paid. Liability of each member is limited to the amount of \$2.

#### g. Current and non-current classification

Assets and liabilities are presented in the statement of financial position based on current and non-current classification. An asset is classified as current when: it is either expected to be realised or intended to be sold or consumed in the Club's normal operating cycle; it is held primarily for the purpose of trading; it is expected to be realised within 12 months after the reporting period; or the asset is cash or cash equivalent unless restricted from being exchanged or used to settle a liability for at least 12 months after the reporting period. All other assets are classified as non-current.

A liability is classified as current when: it is either expected to be settled in the Club's normal operating cycle; it is held primarily for the purpose of trading; it is due to be settled within 12 months after the reporting period; or there is no unconditional right to defer the settlement of the liability for at least 12 months after the reporting period. All other liabilities are classified as non-current.

#### h. Fair value measurement

When an asset or liability, financial or non-financial, is measured at fair value for recognition or disclosure purposes, the fair value is based on the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date; and assumes that the transaction will take place either: in the principal market; or in the absence of a principal market, in the most advantageous market.

Fair value is measured using the assumptions that market participants would use when pricing the asset or liability, assuming they act in their economic best interests. For non-financial assets, the fair value measurement is based on its highest and best use. Valuation techniques that are appropriate in the circumstances and for which sufficient data are available to measure fair value, are used, maximising the use of relevant observable inputs and minimising the use of unobservable inputs.

#### **NOTE 4: INCOME TAX**

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The Directors estimate that the cumulative potential future income tax benefit at 30 September 2019 in respect of tax losses not brought to account is \$661,770 (2018: \$429,839).

This benefit from tax losses will only be obtained if:

- (i) The club derives future assessable income of a nature and of an amount sufficient to enable the benefit from the deductions for the losses to be realised;
  - (ii) The club continues to comply with the conditions for deductibility imposed by tax legislation; and
- (ii) No changes in the tax legislation adversely affect the club in realising the benefit from the deductions for the losses.

Income tax is payable on that proportion of the income less expenses contributed by non-members. The aggregate amount of income tax attributable to the financial year differs from the amount prima facie payable on the operating surplus. The difference is reconciled as follows:

#### **Accounting Policy**

The Club is taxed according to the principle of mutuality. The charge for current income tax expenses is based on the profit for the year adjusted for any non-assessable or disallowed items. It is calculated using tax rates that have been enacted or are substantively enacted by the Statement of Financial Position date.

Deferred tax is accounted for using the Statement of Financial Position liability method in respect of temporary differences arising between the tax bases of assets and liabilities and their carrying amounts in the financial statements. No deferred income tax will be recognised from the initial recognition of an asset or liability, excluding a business combination, where there is no effect on accounting or taxable profit or loss.

Deferred tax is calculated at the tax rates that are expected to apply to the period when the asset is realised or liability is settled. Deferred tax is credited in the income statement except where it relates to items that may be credited directly to equity, in which case the deferred tax is adjusted directly against equity.

Deferred income tax assets are recognised to the extent that it is probable that future tax profits will be available against which deductible temporary differences can be utilised.

The amount of benefits brought to account or which may be realised in the future is based on the assumption that no adverse change will occur in income taxation legislation and the anticipation that the economic entity will derive sufficient future assessable income to enable the benefit to be realised and comply with the conditions of deductibility imposed by the law

#### **Accounting Policy**

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost or fair value less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

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Leasehold land and buildings are measured on the fair value basis, being the amount for which an asset could be exchanged between knowledgeable willing parties in an arm's length transaction. It is the policy of the club to have an independent valuation on a cyclical basis, with annual appraisals being made by the Directors.

#### Plant and equipment

Plant and equipment is stated at historical cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment.

The carrying amount of plant and equipment is reviewed annually by Directors to ensure it is not in excess of the recoverable amount from these assets.

An impairment loss is recognised for the amount by which the asset's carrying amount exceeds its recoverable amount. Recoverable amount is the higher of an asset's fair value less costs of disposal and value-in-use. The value-in-use is the present value of the estimated future cash flows relating to the asset using a pre-tax discount rate specific to the asset or cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs. Assets that do not have independent cash flows are grouped together to form a cash-generating unit.

#### Depreciation

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets including buildings and capitalised lease assets, but excluding freehold land, is depreciated on a straight-line basis over their useful lives to the club commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use. #### **Accounting Policy**

#### Short-term employee benefits

The property lease is a non-cancellable lease with an 88 year term, with rent payable annually in advance. An option exists to purchase the land at the end of 2027.

#### Capital commitments

During the year the Ainslie Football and Social Club Limited (Ainslie) entered into a contract with Dexar Group Pty Ltd (Dexar). The purpose of the contract is for consultation and exploration of feasibility studies for potential supplementary uses and development on land currently owned by Ainslie. The potential minimum value of the contract is \$1,000,000 on delivery of performance requirements identified within the agreement. As at the end of the financial year \$50,000 had been paid to Dexar.

#### Accounting Policy

Leases of fixed assets where substantially all the risks and benefits incidental to the ownership of the asset, but not the legal ownership that are transferred to the entity are classified as finance leases.

Leased assets are depreciated on a straight-line basis over the shorter of their estimated useful lives or the lease term.

Lease payments for operating leases, where substantially all the risks and benefits remain with the lessor, are charged as expenses in the periods in which they are incurred. Lease incentives under operating leases are recognised as a liability and amortised on a straight-line basis over the life of the lease term.

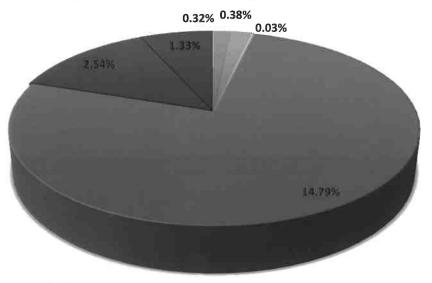

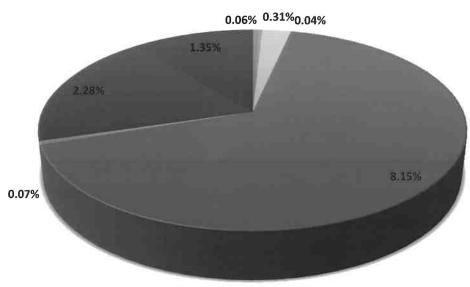

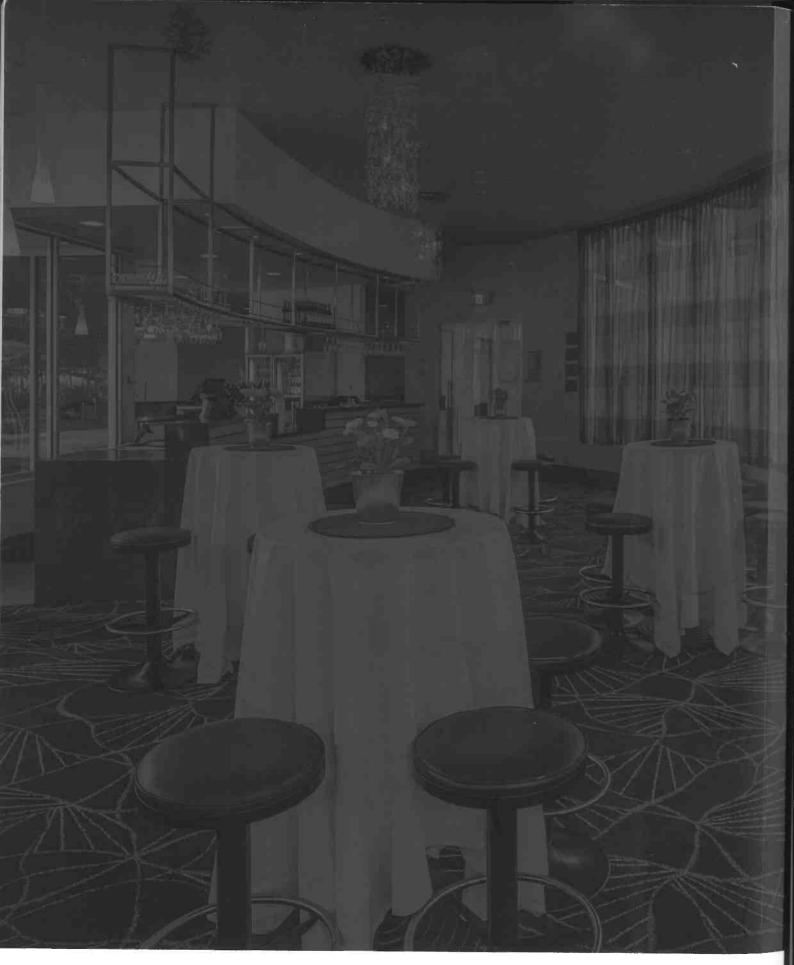
